# LOOKING AHEAD TO FALL HARVEST

It seems like we just finished up last year's harvest, and now we're already done — or nearly done — with planting, which means it's time to start thinking about another harvest season to come. Look ahead at what your needs will be: large and small tires, tracks, or any of the boogies. If you need to have your tracks aligned, get ahold of us and we will see if we can get it corrected. Some Tracks, Quads and Camso are 8 to 12 weeks out, so try and order early.

As for servicing vehicles, whether it is a small car or a large semi-tractor, we can do them all. We do tune ups, all types of air conditioning work, brake work, front end repairs, ride disturbance problems (such as issues with your shock strights) and much more.

## ZONES OF INFLUENCE: WHAT TO DO AND WHEN

When we think about plant health or enhancing crop growth, we like to break it into zones of influence.

**Zone 1:** Products added at the time of planting; including fungicides, nematicides, growth regulators and inoculants.

**Zone 2:** Products added at the time of your first post-emergence application.

**Zone 3:** Products applied during early reproductive stages. These can be additional micronutrients, growth regulators and stress reducing products that are added to a herbicide application.

A growth regulator that we have been working with is Treble which can be used anytime post-emergence to early reproductive stages in your application. Treble is a hormone-based biostimulant containing essential amino acids to help mitigate stress and improve yields.

If you're growing Enlist E3 soybeans, another product to consider is Mitigate Plus, which triggers the plant's natural abilities to minimize stress while providing efficient energy to the plant resulting in

quicker recovery and metabolism.

When applying Enlist herbicides to soybeans, the plant has to metabolize the herbicide and can display some laziness or drooping for a day or two. Mitigate Plus can be added anytime you use Enlist herbicides (or any other herbicides) to help a plant overcome environmental stressors.

A final item when looking at enhancing plant growth is the addition of micronutrient products whenever spraying fields post-emergence. There are a variety of micronutrient products that can be added. One is Sulpak, which contains sulfur — a key nutrient found in every living cell which is important in the formation of proteins. Similarly, Borpak contains boron which is essential for cell wall formation and is key in reproductive structures, leading to adequate grain fill and flowering.

There are other micronutrient packages available, depending upon the nutrients you are targeting, that we can choose from. Call your agronomist to discuss your options or if you have any questions about these products. ◆



# TAKING CARE OF YOUR PESKY PESTS!

Make sure to scout your field for pests, weeds and weed height to make sure your crop application of herbicides work properly. Also confirm you have the correct herbicide for the traits of beans you plant, such as Roundup Ready, Enlist E3™, Xtend®, LibertyLink®, or LLGT. Applying fungicides post-emergence to your corn and beans is getting more traction with the commodity prices we are now working with and showing in the yield.

Side dressing application of nitrogen should be happening now to make sure your crop has the nutrients for the year. If you need us to do side dressing applications, please give us a call.

Looking ahead to fall fertilizer and application season, it is looking like the market is going to be up. Talk to your agronomist, and we can work with you through this. ◆
